He will discuss the CVMA's effort to protect its members' clients, patients and state from disease, fraud and unethical conduct too frequently associated with dog trafficking. He exposes the ways animal exporting states, citizens, rescues, and some animal control agencies turn a blind eye to unintended spontaneous reproduction of domestic animals at home, allowing other states to carry their load.

9:00 David Waters, DVM, PhD: In Search of a Strategic Disturbance: Some Thoughts on the Timing of Spaying presents a thoughtful re-evaluation of our assumptions regarding the health consequences of elective ovariohysterectomy in pet dogs. Conventional wisdom says spaying promotes longevity. However, recent evidence from 3 different species – dog, human, mouse – points to a potentially contradictory conclusion: *Ovaries are part of a system that promotes longevity.* This lecture takes a look at the experimental evidence, encouraging a systems approach so that we might re-shape our thinking about the physiological impact of spaying and commit ourselves to making spaying a strategic physiological disturbance.
